### **Going to State**

### 2019 Breeding Livestock at Fair

If you wish to exhibit a breeding animal of any species at the 2019 Lyon County Fair, you must be enrolled in the breeding project for that respective species by May 1. Again this year, all breeding livestock to be exhibited at the 2019 Lyon County Fair will need to be tagged at the regular county tagging either in February or April. The only exception will be for registered purebred livestock that will not have to have a county tag, if they have proper tattoos/ear notches/scrapies tag and registration papers that match. Ownership of these animals must be verified by registration papers showing immediate family ownership by May 1. Please visit the Extension Office before May 1 with proper registration paperwork in hand (or bring to regular schedule county tagging dates and papers will be gathered to be photo copied and you will be responsible for picking your papers up from the office after a copy can be made).

### **Spring Rabbit Show**

### Market Beef Weigh-In & Tagging

Market beef weigh-in and tagging is scheduled for Saturday, Feb. 2, from 8 a.m. to 10 a.m. at the fairgrounds. Ear tags will cost \$3 and must be paid for at the time of weigh-in. You must know the birth date and breed of your animal. Your animal must be present. Your animal must have a halter and be able to lead. If you are unable to bring your animal that day, please make arrangements with another family to bring your animal.

### **Tractor Safety**

Lyon, Chase, Coffey, and Morris County Extension Offices will be working together to host the 2018 Hazardous Occupation Training (H.O.T.) classes for all youth who will be working for area ag producers. Training is scheduled for March 13 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. at PrairieLand Partners. Youth ages 14-16 will be eligible for a certificate showing completion of the H.O.T. training. Younger students may come and take the test, but they will not be able to receive their certificate until their 14<sup>th</sup> birthday.

Students need to pre-register by March 6 so they can receive and work on their class materials prior to the first session. Please call the Extension office for more information or stop by to pick up a registration form.

### 2019 Dicamba Applicator Training

If you grow soybeans in the area and are thinking about using one of the herbicide products below that contain dicamba, please pay attention to the information below from State Extension Specialist Dallas Peterson.

Dicamba or auxin-specific training was required for the first time last year for anyone planning to apply Engenia, Xtendimax, or FeXapan herbicides. In-person training in Kansas was provided by the three registrants (BASF, Monsanto, and DuPont) and Kansas State University. On-line training from the registrants was made available later in the spring. At that point in time, it was unclear whether the training was going to be an annual requirement. When the products were re-registered this past fall, it was clearly stated that **annual** training would be required by **anyone** who applies those products.

The Kansas Department of Agriculture has indicated that it is the registrants' responsibility to provide the training. K-State will **NOT** be providing dicamba applicator training this year. The understanding is that BASF, Bayer, and DuPont will be hosting dicamba applicator training meetings this winter/spring and making on-line training available sometime in the near future. Consult with your local Ag product supplier for possible training meeting dates and locations.

To recap the major label required changes for 2019:

- Annual training is required
- EVERYONE that applies must be trained (not just the person supervising application)
- By the label, it is the registrant's (manufacturer) responsibility to provide training
- KEEP IN CONTACT WITH YOUR SUPPLIER about upcoming training events in the area!!

Be sure to use any herbicide products wisely!

There are two or three pieces of information that I receive multiple requests for throughout the year, and the Bluestem Pasture Report is one of those. The others are generally Custom Rates and ag leasing information.

### **Burning and Burn Permits for 2019**

As we approach springtime in the Flint Hills of Kansas, thoughts turn to the annual burning of the native rangelands. It's been discussed on the radio – in January!

2019 is the second year of the two-year permit cycle (2018-19) for burn permits in Lyon County. Permits are available at the sheriff's office as well as most of the city offices of the outlying communities. Permits picked up in the spring of 2018 are still in effect for 2019.

After the extremely dry conditions for much of the summer, growing conditions were more favorable in late 2018, so there is a good fuel load in many pastures this year. We must make certain that when fire is used as a management tool, it is used with extreme caution. **PLEASE BE CAREFUL!!** 

Please make use of the planning tools at **ksfire.org** (active March 1- May 1), abide by the Kansas Smoke Management plan which limits non-rangeland burning during April, and be certain to have enough fire-fighting equipment and expertise to control the burn.

In Lyon County, burn permits are required for open burning of grass, woody species, crop residue and other dry plant growth for the purpose of land, crop, range, pasture and wildlife or watershed management. Be sure to call 620-343-4225 to provide your permit number both before starting your controlled burn as well as after it is completed. Remember to check with your local officials to confirm any city regulations on open burns.

### 2018 Farm Bill Update

By now, most recognize that a "Farm Bill" was passed in Washington, DC. What is in it, and how will it be implemented for the next 5 years that it covers?

The truth at this point is that we really don't know for sure how it will be implemented, as details are still being finalized on the implementation side of things, and that becomes more of a challenge with the government shut down. I understand that the legislation did have a clause that there would be a plan within 60 days of approval, so that means there will need to be a plan in March.

What do we know for certain? First, the ARC and PLC terms we learned in the 2014 Farm Bill will remain, with some relatively minor revisions or tweaks. One of the biggest changes is that the selection that will *probably* be made in April or May of 2019 will only be binding for the first two marketing years of the Farm Bill (crops harvested in 2019 and 2020) and allow for an annual election or change for each of the final three marketing years (2021, 22 and 23). This has the potential to allow for recognition of market trends and adjustments instead of being locked into one plan for five years. There are also some changes in how prices are calculated, and the RMA data will be the preferred yield figures.

Stay tuned as there will be more information on the changes and hopefully some decision tools will be developed to help make a more informed decision.

### **Youth Tractor Safety Training**

Agriculture producers can allow their 14 and 15-year-old children to operate farm machinery for their family. However, the Fair Labor Standards Act prohibits Kansas farmers who are not the parents from hiring youth in these age groups unless the teenagers have taken special safety training courses offered through 4-H and vo-ag programs. That law also applies for corporations where the family members are employees of the corporation. We will host a local opportunity for youth on March 13 from 9 – 4 at PrairieLand Partners John Deere just west of Emporia. As this is pretty much a day-long event, lunch and snacks will be provided for the registered youth participants.

Please come by the Lyon County Extension Office at 2632 W Hwy 50 in Emporia by March 6 to register and pick up the manual and pre-tests. ## **Board Leadership Series Planned for February**

K-State Research and Extension – Lyon County will be hosting the K-State Research and Extension's Board Leadership workshop in February and March.

### **Plant Cool-season Crops in March**

As we move through February and March draws closer, it is time to start thinking about planting our gardens. Some of our garden crops can withstand the colder day- and night-time temperatures that we see during the later winter and early spring months.

Mid-March is a good time to start to plant garden crops such as broccoli, lettuce, peas, and potatoes, whereas beets, cabbage, endive, cauliflower, radish, onions/onion sets, spinach and turnips should be planted towards the end of the month. Remember, all of these planting times are just an estimate. The time to begin planting our garden crops can vary depending on the year because of any unseasonal weather patterns that may occur. For a more detailed vegetable garden calendar, please stop by the Extension Office to get a copy.

### **Soil Temperature and Vegetables**

One of the most neglected tools for vegetable gardeners is a soil thermometer. Soil temperature is a much better measure of when to plant than air temperature or the calendar. Planting when soil is too cool can cause seeds to rot and transplants to sit there.

A number of vegetables can germinate and grow at cool temperatures. For example, peas will germinate and grow well at a soil temperature of 40 F. Though lettuce, parsnips, and spinach can sprout at a soil temperature of 35 F, they prefer at least 45 F for best germination and growth. Radishes also do well at a soil temperature of 45 F. Warm-season crops such as tomatoes, sweet corn and beans prefer at least 55 F for germination (or transplanting), but others such as peppers, cucumbers, melons and sweet potatoes need it even warmer, about 60 F.

Taking soil temperature accurately is a bit of a science. First, use a metal soil thermometer, which is sold in many garden, auto parts and hardware stores. Take temperature 2.5 inches deep at about 10 to 11 a.m. Temperature variations throughout the day and night affect soil temperature, with lowest readings after dawn and warmest around mid-afternoon. The late-morning reading gives a good average temperature. If taking the soil temperature at this time is not practical, take a reading before you leave

for work and a second when you return home and use the average. Also, be sure to get a consistent reading for four to five days in a row before planting, and make sure a cold snap is not predicted.

### **Cut Back Ornamental Grasses**

March is a good time to remove dead foliage from ornamental grasses. Grasses green up earlier if foliage is removed and are more attractive without a mixture of dead and live leaves. A number of tools can be used including hand clippers, weed whips (if the foliage is of a small enough diameter), weed whips with a circular blade, or even a chain saw. Use the top of the chainsaw bar to cut so the saw doesn't pull in debris and clog.

Also, it is often helpful to tie foliage together before cutting so it doesn't interfere and is easier to dispose of. Burning is another option — but only if it is safe and legal to do so. Note that these grasses may not burn long, but they burn extremely hot. Even so, the crown of the plant is not damaged and new growth appears relatively quickly.

If the center of the clump shows little growth, the plant would benefit from division. Dig up the entire clump and separate. Then replant the vigorous growth found on the outer edge of the clump.

### **Produce Safety Challenges**

Since 2011, more than 20 foodborne illness outbreaks have occurred from North American produce. The foods involved were cantaloupe, romaine

lettuce, cucumbers, frozen vegetables and others. In 2018 alone, romaine lettuce has been linked to two large recalls. This is costly not only in illnesses and unfortunate deaths, but complete disruption in the supply chain

Produce safety is an ongoing challenge. Safe potable water is critical for growing produce, but also in harvest and processing. If water is high in mineral deposits, it

can cause pathogen survival. Soil residue also impacts cleanliness and sanitation.

Water temperature will change the sanitizer stability and efficacy. If water is too cold, the sanitizer will not work properly. If water is too hot, sanitizers can vaporize and release toxic gases. Produce quality can also be affected which can reduce shelf life. The acidity or pH of water must also be monitored.

Contact time of sanitizers and disinfectants will dictate the effectiveness. If left on too long, off flavors will linger and can become a chemical hazard.

The produce surface texture can trap bacteria or make them difficult to remove soil and debris. Bruises and other damage also lead to ineffective cleaning. Learn more at https://bit.ly/2rAy36g.



### **Handling Recalled Food**

Food recalls happen almost daily, and many do not get a lot of publicity. In a majority of recalls, it is the manufacturer that issues a

voluntary recall.

Manufacturers will work with the FDA or USDA to help determine the reason for the recall and to fix the issue. If foodborne illnesses have occurred, the CDC and state health departments will also be involved.

As consumers, it is important to pay attention to recalls eliminating the chance of getting sick. Recall announcements give specific information about the food recall including the type of food, brand, package size, date codes, manufacturer codes, shelf life dates, distribution locations, and other pertinent information.

If you have a recalled food, take it back to where it was purchased for a refund, or throw it away. Do not take the chance of eating it or feeding it to animals. Learn more at www.foodsafety.gov/recalls/index.html.



### Be the MVP of Your Super Bowl Party

The big game is almost here and it's time for a party! And where there's a party, there's food! Be the MVP of your party with these food safety tips:

### Clean: Prepare for the win!

- Start by washing your hands with warm soapy water for 20 seconds.
- Wash and sanitize all dishware and utensils.

Separate: Your best defense!

- Keep raw meat and poultry away from ready-to-eat foods
- Use a clean utensil for each dish.
- Use a clean plate when going for second helpings of food.

### Cook: A game winner!

- Use a food thermometer to check for doneness
- All poultry—165°F
- Burgers and sliders—160°F
- Soup and reheated foods—165°F

### Chill: Don't let the clock expire!

- Keep hot foods hot and cold foods cold.
- Put out food in batches.
- Follow the 2-hour rule.



### Could Quinoa be the Fountain of Youth?

Quinoa is known as a superfood because it is a complete protein and

has positive effects on metabolism and energy balance. Now research from Rutgers University and North Carolina State University, has found that quinoa could slow down the aging process.

The research study used a nematode worm, C. elegans, which has a short lifespan but age comparably to humans. They found improvements in lifespan, locomotor function, and mitochondrial bioenergetics. They found reductions in body fat and advanced glycation end products which worsen degenerative disease such as diabetes, kidney disease and Alzheimer's disease. They also found lower reactive oxygen species, or oxygen radicals, which can damage DNA, RNA, and proteins leading to cell death. More research and clinical studies are needed to confirm these findings.
